The whole film is shown on the ASL, and basically deaf people talk about their experiences. For example, there is one part where several deaf people are shown speaking in quick succession whenever they missed something at a family reunion and asked for more information, they were always told, Later or It's not important. The film also discusses the consequences of not teaching a deaf child to sign or teaching sign language if you are a deaf child. The heartbreaking story was told by a man who never heard his mother's death because he couldn't sign for her, and when he finally found the pen and paper he wrote, he died before he could finish. It's a good movie that can open a lot of ignorant eyes. I just watched this movie in my ASL 1 class on Tuesday. Maybe we'll say 20 to 25 minutes of the video when our teacher kind of got ready. He was told he only taught an hour before first grade. I want to see the whole thing that I hope will be available online. I wrote notes. Now she advocates learning sign language for parents of deaf children so that no one ever has to go through what she had to go through. I believe that parents of all deaf children should embrace their children and their new culture and learn the language in which their child is easiest to communicate. Most deaf children feel lonely and abandoned from their families because no one ever bothers to see them in family conversations. Every time a deaf person asked what was going on, they'd say, We'll tell you later. It's always the same thing and deaf people are tired of it. They want to know now and come with them! It's not fair that you have to leave them out just because they're deaf. It causes depression and heartburn in a deaf person when the family constantly excludes a deaf family member. In some situations, deafness was considered evil. One man said his aunt told him he must have been a bad man in his past life and as punishment he was born deaf during this lifetime. Hearing deafness is unlucky, but that does not justify how they are treated by consulting people. I think it's terrible how they're considered incapable. I wouldn't want to imagine anyone treating me like I can't because I'm Latino or because I'm gay. It would tear me apart and I'm sure most deaf people feel the same way.
